Literature Sent to Every Voter.

The "suff" campaign has been conducted for the whole State from the headquarters in Boston, 585 Boylston st.

Here, headed by Mrs. Gertrude Halladay Leonard, chairman of the executive board of the Massachusetts Woman Suffrage Association, and Mrs. Benjamin E. Pitman, chairman of the ways and means committee, a staff of women, which at its largest, numbered 125, has worked unceasingly, preparing and sending out suffrage literature, arranging meetings, corresponding with the branch organizations of the parent association, and otherwise conducting a vigorous campaign of publicity.

Suffragist literature has been placed in the hands of every voter in the State. Not less than 635,000 circulars were sent out in the final issue. The suffragists believe that this circularization is the most complete on record in Massachusetts campaigns.

The Final Appeal.

The final circular contained, among other things, the language of the proposed amendment to the Constitution, told where it appears on the official ballot (following the amendment to provide homesteads for citizens), and concluded with this appeal:

Men of Massachusetts:

The women of Massachusetts are making this appeal to you to grant them the same rights under the law as are now enjoyed by the women of California, Washington, Kansas, Montana, Colorado, Wyoming, Idaho, Utah, Nevada, Arizona, Oregon and Illinois.

If you feel that your mother, your

wife, your daughter can be trusted to vote honestly and for the best interests of the home, the children and the State that we all love, show your belief in them by marking your ballot with a cross against the word YES on the amendment enabling women to vote.

The eyes of the Nation are watching the State of Massachusetts to see whether the men of our State are willing to trust the mothers, wives and daughters of the Commonwealth. Election day Nov 2.

God save the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

An organization which has embraced branches in every city and town in the State, with possibly a few unimportant exceptions, has aided in the conduct of the campaign.

These organizations have conducted, in all important places, a house-to-house canvass of voters to learn their views and if possible secure their pledges.

The number of women identified with the association and its branches has been placed at 100,000.

The campaign managers of the suffragists have found strength in the indorsement of organized labor and of 60 granges in the State. Edward Chapman, master of the Massachusetts State Grange, has been among their speakers. The list includes also a number of well-known labor orators.

Five candidates for Governor in Massachusetts have also indorsed equal suffrage and this fact has been used with effect in the campaign. Other prominent Massachusetts men have also been named as friends of suffrage, including Ex-Congressman Samuel L. Powers, Charles Sumner Bird, Joseph Walker, Samuel J. Elder, James H. Vahey, various Congressmen and the chief executives of a number of cities, including Mayor Curley of Boston, Mayor Stacey of Springfield, Mayor Haines of Medford, Mayor Connery of Lynn and Mayor Murphy of Lowell.
